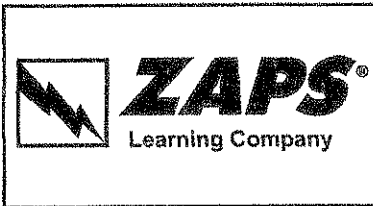
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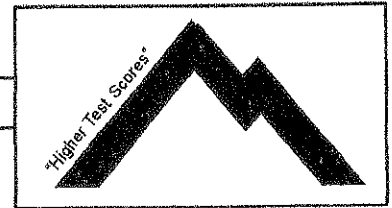

Dear Students and Parents:

Many colleges require an SAT test score as one of the criteria for admission. The PSAT is the basis for the National Merit Scholarship. The SAT and the PSAT are basically the same test, with an essay section included on the SAT. We have arranged a five-hour seminar for your son or daughter that will allow them to become more familiar with the PSAT/SAT and give them a chance to improve their score. Frequently Asked Questions

What is the SAT?

The SAT or Scholastic Assessment Test is a college admissions exam given seven times a year. There are currently three sections: writing, critical reading and math. The writing component includes a 25 minute essay. The SAT takes three hours and 45 minutes. Each subject is scored on a scale of 200-800 points and combined for a total SAT score. The national average is about 1525.

What is the PSAT?

The PSAT is the Preliminary Scholastic Assessment Test. It is a two hour test given once a year in October. There are five separate sections: two math sections, two verbal sections, and one writing skills section. Each subject is scored on a scale from 20 to 80 points for a total of 240 maximum points. National Merit Scholarship semifinalists are selected based on the PSAT score.

What is the ACT?

The ACT or American College Testing Assessment Test is a college admissions exam given six times a year. There are four sections: english, math, reading and science, and an optional essay. The ACT takes two hours and 55 minutes, plus the optional 30 minute essay section. You will receive four scores on the ACT, one for each section. Each section is scored on a scale of 1-36 points. You will also receive a composite score which is the average of the four scores. The national average is about 21. Your essay score will be reported separately.

When should I take my first ACT or SAT Test?

We encourage students to attempt both the SAT and the ACT during their Junior year. Once they determine which test they score better at, if necessary, they can then concentrate on improving that particular test score during their Senior year.

Can I take the tests more than once?

Yes, students often take these tests two or three times. Colleges may look at how many times you have taken the test, but they are only interested in your highest score.

Do test prep seminars really help?
